Rebecca Bell-Martin (CONFIRMED)

Research Professor

Dr. Rebecca V. Bell-Martin is a political scientist and Research Professor in the School of Government at el Instituto Tecnológico y de Estudios Superiores de Monterrey. She earned her PhD from Brown University and has a decade of experience studying Mexican politics. Her research focuses on the intersection of politics and public security, with emphasis on the political dynamics of criminal violence. Rebecca regularly contributes to policy discussions in both countries and has advised policymakers on issues related to US-Mexico security relations.

Tony, Ph.D., is the Françoise and Edward Djerejian Fellow for Mexico Studies and director of the Center for the United States and Mexico at Rice University's Baker Institute for Public Policy. Between 2001 and 2015, Payan was a professor of political science at The University of Texas at El Paso. His research focuses primarily on border studies, particularly the U.S.-Mexico border.
